This Public Artwork was commissioned by Abbot's Hospital in Guildford to celebrate the 400th Anniversary of the founding of Abbot's Hospital by George Abbot, Archbishop of Canterbury.

Husband and wife team Carlos Espana and Liliana Montoya, local fine artists and ceramicists from Aluna Ceramics, were tasked with the design and creation of four ceramic panels made up of a total of just over 700 handmade, hand modelled and hand painted tiles that commemorate George Abbot and the life in the Alms House, which he endowed four centuries ago.

The design of the panels was inspired and informed by Abbot's Hospital's history, its original furniture and architectural features, as well as community art workshops held by the artists with residents from Abbot's Hospital and students from two local schools.

The meticulous fine art painting, decorative motifs and colourful ceramic pigments used are the result of several months of research carried out by the artists prior to their design and execution at their studio, based at the Lockwood Centre in Guildford.

Each panel measures 1.20 m by 1.90 m, and depicts 100 years of history in dream-like scenes of the Grade I Listed building's lifetime. They are held within a stainless steel outer frame for uniformity, but each mural also has a different coloured border and contains unique three-dimensional ceramic elements that change in shape and size to give each one a flavour of its own.

On a compositional level, the four panels share the same pattern and structural concepts, consisting of the use of the golden spiral or Fibonacci's spiral, as the internal framework that holds and guides the eye through the imagery.

The main feature in each panel is placed at the centre of this golden spiral. For example, in the first panel, the focal point of the spiral is the portrait of George Abbot. In the second and third panels, back and front views of Abbot's Hospital through the ages are centerpieces, and in the fourth panel the focus of the spiral is a side view of Abbot's Hospital and the High Street in modern times.

All the lines in the spirals in all the panels deliberately unravel into several converging lines to provide the viewer with a greater sense of movement and vibrant emotion to reflect the flowing and passing of time from one century to the next. Also worth noting, is the changing direction of the structural spiral in each panel, to create a visual impression in the shape of a heart that is formed when you stand facing panels 1 and 2 and panels 3 and 4 together, thus symbolising unity and community.

The eras depicted in the murals include illustrations of key events and changes that have taken place throughout the last 400 years, which are of great local, national and international importance for the country and humanity as a whole - some of these are poppies to signify war and remembrance, the King James' Bible, Newton's refraction of light, Fermat's last theorem, the Industrial Revolution, the Act of Union of Scotland with England and Wales, the beginning of the slums, the Abolition of the Slavery Act, the discovery of penicillin, the evacuation of Dunkirk, the foundations of the Welfare State and the discovery of DNA, to name a few.

There is even a delightful tribute to the 1960s period and music depicted with a Yellow Submarine Beatles tile complete with some sheet music.




